

### December 1 The Word ~ John 1:1

Before you enter the world every day, meet with Jesus first. Let him be the light on your path so you won't stumble or get lost (John 8:12). Let him be the salt in your mouth so your tongue won't set fire and stain yourself and others (Galatians 4:6).

Start your day with God's Word. Start your day with a date with Jesus.

# December 3 Mighty God ~ Isaiah 9:6

He desires to share his unlimited mightiness with us as he tells us we can turn to him for strength. In Ephesians 6:10, we are told to "be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might." This verse in Ephesians is part of the well-known passage about the armor of God. Just like you choose to put on armor to head into battle, we need to choose to be strengthened by God, and in the power of His might. When we feel weak, we can choose to turn to God for strength.

So, as we go through the challenges and trials of this sinful world, take comfort and rest assure that the God we trust is Mighty.

Prayer: We praise you that you are a mighty God, and you do mighty things! One of the mightiest was sending your son to make an unrighteous people, righteous, in a righteous way. ### December 4 Everlasting Father ~ Isaiah 9:6

Have you ever received a gift and you didn't fully understand all that the gift was, could do or accomplish? You had to carefully read instructions or be extensively instructed in order to enjoy the gift at its full potential? With that in mind, I want you to imagine that you're opening Isaiah 9:6 as a present.

"For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

You open this gift of all gifts to see a baby born in a stable to poor parents; he's wrapped in swaddling clothes and a manger is his bed. This child is born for you. He is the Son of God given to you. From all eternity He existed in perfect unity with the Father and the Spirit but his incarnation marks the starting point for his humanity and he did so for you.

At the end of the verse we're given a beautiful quartet of names that heap blessing upon blessing for us. In the Bible, names are not chosen based on what's trending in the culture or family. Names represent the intrinsic nature of the person. So, the significance and meaning of this gift is revealed and opened to us. Through the Spirit, Isaiah tells us God's Son has come to be to us our *Wonderful Counselor*, *Mighty God*, *Everlasting Father*, *Prince of Peace*.

So how do we understand that this Child's name is Everlasting Father? First let us make the distinction that the Son is not the Father - they are distinct within the Trinity. But Jesus is *to us* an Everlasting Father. In ancient times, the father of a nation shared a similar role as the father of a family. These men were tasked with protecting and providing for those under their care. In a similar way, this Child, Jesus, will become King and be a father to His children - protecting, providing, watching over, and guiding us to our heavenly home. And because he is our everlasting father, He is not limited by aging or death but lives forever in perpetuity.

Oh, the blessings of having Jesus as our Everlasting Father! As Spurgeon once said, "There is no unfathering Christ, and there is no unchilding us," He is everlastingly a father to those who trust in him."

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank you for the child born to us, the Son given for us - Jesus. Help us to trust His fatherly care for us in every moment of our lives. Teach us more and more about who you are so that we may love and adore you increasingly

# December 5 Prince of Peace ~ Isaiah 9:6

Humanly speaking we all seek peace; that wonderful feeling that all is right with the world! At this time of year, we hope for peace, saying, "peace on earth, good will towards men." In Isaiah 9:6, Jesus is called the Prince of Peace. Indeed, it is Jesus who came to earth to bring his Father's perfect peace.

What is the peace that God gives mankind? The Bible has a lot to say about how we get it and the word peace appears over 400 times in scripture. Fundamentally the scriptures talk about the peace we can have with God as well as the peace we are called to have with our fellowman. Let us walk through the Bible to explore some thoughts on both.

First let's look at Peace with God. "....the Kingdom of God is...righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit." (Roman 14:17) God's peace comes through justification. "Since we have been justified through faith we have peace with God though our Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:1) Peace comes through loving God's law. "Great peace have those who love your law and nothing can make them stumble." (Psalm 119:165)

Next, God wants to bless us with His peace. "He makes me lie down in green pastures and leads you beside still waters." (Psalm 23:2) "Peace I leave with you. My Peace I give you, not as the world gives. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let it be afraid." (John 14:27) "In peace I will lie down and sleep, for you alone, Lord, make me dwell in safety." (Psalm 29:11)

Finally, God calls us to have peace with one another. "If possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone." (Romans12:18) "Make every effort to live in peace with everyone and be holy; without holiness no one will see God." (Hebrews 12:14) "Whoever would love life and see good days must seek peace and pursue it." (1Peter 3:10) May the very words of God bless you as you ponder these thoughts on peace this Christmas season!

Prayer: Prince of Peace, fill us this Christmas with a fresh knowledge of the peace we have because of what you have done for us. Help us seek peace with everyone you place in our path. And "may the peace that passes all understanding guard our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus!" Amen.

#### December 6 Son of God ~ Luke 1:35

Luke 1:35 - !And the angel answered her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy - the Son of God.'"

To understand Gabriel's answer to Mary we need to put it in context, so a brief summary of verses 1:26-34: Mary was a virgin who was engaged to a man named Joseph who was a descendant of David. Gabriel told Mary that she would conceive a child to be named Jesus (Messiah). This child would be called the Son of the Most High (God) and that he would sit on the throne of David forever. Mary asked how this would happen since she was a virgin and verse 35 is his answer.

This child that Mary conceived was begotten of God through the power of the Holy Spirit and therefore had the very nature of God so that he could be called the Son of God. Hebrews 1:3 states that this son "is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of his nature, and he upholds the universe with his power." As the Son of God, he shares God's divine nature, as the son of Mary, he has a human nature. Joseph was his legal father, but not his biological father therefore Jesus did not have a sinful, human nature. He is fully God and fully man. In Jesus' divine nature, he lived a sinless life of obedience so he could be the ..."Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." (John 1:29)

Just as the three persons of the trinity cooperated in the creation of the world, so they each had a role in the redemption of mankind; God conceived the Son through the power of the Holy Spirit, and the Son took on human form and lived, died and was resurrected to achieve the redemption of mankind. How truly awesome that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16)

Often when I think of the Son of God coming to earth and entering time and space as a man, I think of a quote from C.S. Lewis on the incarnation: "If this thing happened, it was the central event in the history of the earth." (*Miracles*, p.108) Amen! Something we should celebrate at Christmas, but think about and wonder at all year long.

Prayer: Lord God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the depth and breadth of your love for us as demonstrated by your plan of redemption is truly overwhelming. Thank you, Lord Jesus, that by becoming man you understand us, our struggles and our joys, and that you are not only our Savior ,but our Great High Priest, and our intercessor. We offer you the praise and worship you deserve. In your holy name we pray. Amen.

### December 7 Jesus ~ Matthew 1:21

### "She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

This passage is very familiar to us, but we often fail to understand what exactly Matthew is saying. In today's world, names are not as significant to people as they were in Jesus' time. In this passage, Matthew tells us exactly who Jesus is and what his name means.

Jesus means Yahweh saves and was a common name in Israel. Yahweh carries the hope that God will save Israel, but in Biblical times people understood it in more literal terms. But in this passage, the angels are proclaiming so much more. They are telling Joseph that Jesus will save us all from the bondage of our sins.

The angel comes to Joseph to let him know that what Mary is telling him is the truth and that Jesus is the Messiah. We are so privileged to have a God who loves us so much to have sent His Son to die for our sins and transgressions.

We all know the three gifts that the Wisemen brought to Jesus as gold, frankincense and myrrh, but God has also given us three gifts in Jesus Christ. 1.) A Son of David who fulfills God's promise of a king who will reign forever; 2.) A child who is God's Son and conceived by the Holy Spirit; and 3.) A Great Deliverer, who saves his people from their sins. Jesus's half-brother James later writes (James 1:17) that there is no more precious than the gift of Jesus. Nothing can or ever will compare to this gift to us.

**Prayer:** Lord, I thank you and praise you for the most amazing gift we could have ever received from you. Your Son, Jesus Christ, is the only gift we ever need. I thank you, Lord, for all the wonderful blessings we have and the promise that one day we will be allowed to enter into your kingdom. Please Lord, help me to never take your most precious gift Jesus Christ for granted. In Jesus' name I pray, Amen!

#### December 8 Immanuel ~ Matthew 1:23

It was almost lunchtime on a hot day in my Hebrew conversation class in Jerusalem. I was trying to concentrate on the prepositional phrase we were studying - *with us*, instead of food and the heat.

with us ... immanu

Our friends will be eating **with us** (*immanu*) tonight. We appreciate you meeting **with us** (*immanu*) today. David is staying **with us** (*immanu*) for a week.

Everyday occurrences ... doing life together ... *with us* ... *immanu*.

Then it struck me (I'm a slow learner). We weren't just learning a grammar pattern. What we were really studying was a description of the present and eternal reality of the incarnation ... Immanu-El ... the with-us-God.\* Even though my orthodox classmates didn't seem to make this connection, for me it was as if God interrupted the class and said, "That's who I am. Immanu-El. It isn't simply a name I had when I was laid in a manger so many years ago. And it's not just my name in the critical events of your life. No. I am the currently and constantly present with-us-God ... Immanu-El ... in all of the day-to-day routines of your life - eating with you, meeting with you, staying with you. In all of the mundane, the difficult, the joyful, and the painful routines of your life, my heart's desire is to be your with-us-God." And this incomprehensible desire of the Godhead to be with us - with you and with me - has been revealed and repeated throughout Scripture. In the Exodus, God rescued His people from slavery "out of the land of Egypt so that [He] might dwell among them" (Ex. 29:46). In times of distress, David reminds us that "the LORD of Armies is with us - immanu; the God of Jacob is our stronghold" (Ps. 46:7). And Solomon's prayer is ours: "May the LORD our God be with us immanu - as He was with our ancestors" (I Kings 8:57). We look forward to the day that John the Revelator foretold when he "heard a loud voice from the throne say, 'See! God's dwelling is with mankind, and He will live with them. They will be His people, and He himself, God-with-them, will be their God'" (Rev. 21:3).

Prayer: Dear heavenly Father, we thank you for being *Immanuel* - the *with-us-God*. As we prepare to celebrate Your birth, may we also live in the reality of Your presence with us in the daily routines of life and in light of Your future coming to dwell *with us* forever. Amen.

\*"El" is a shortened form of the Hebrew name of God - "Elohim."

### "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:11

There were times when those half-eaten rolls of Lifesavers got stuck down in the bottom of my pockets. . .full of lint. . .so much so that I didn't want them anymore. An abundance of Lifesavers. I believe we treat God's grace in much the same way. His abounding grace is freely given to us, but many times our attempts at self-sufficiency get in the way. We know his provision is within our reach but turning to Him can sometimes not be what we want because we think it means giving up control. It's cherry. It's orange.

But accepting this free gift is exactly what we need – because it is the only thing that will save us. Save us from our brokenness, our sin. And bring us back to the safety of knowing that God gave us his only Son, Jesus - a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. We can rest in that assurance, that by believing in Him, we are saved.

# December 10 The Lamb of God ~ John 1:29

"The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!"

In Genesis chapter 22, we see a foreshadowing of Christ's advent. Abraham is taking his only son Isaac to the top of Mount Moriah in obedience to God's direction to sacrifice the boy. On the way up, Isaac asks his father, "Behold, the fire and the wood, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Likely not realizing the profoundness of his answer, Abraham responded, "God will provide for himself the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." Before Abraham could raise the knife to kill his son, God provided a ram as a substitute sacrifice. But centuries later, God would provide an even more astonishing and magnificent substitute to atone for man's sin!

Why did God command the Israelites to sacrifice animals? As Nancy Guthrie explains, "The daily killing of lambs was meant to show that sin has a consequence, and it is death. The sacrifice of an innocent substitute was necessary to obtain forgiveness and to approach God."

Most Jews of Jesus' day were engaged in this ritual of substitutionary sacrifice. As John the Baptist proclaimed Jesus as "the Lamb of God," those present would have taken notice. John was announcing the ultimate sacrifice for sinful men, a representative perfectly acceptable to God the Father because Jesus had no blemish of sin.

"...you were ransomed,...not with perishable things such as silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot." (I Peter 1:18,19)

This divine Lamb willingly took on the sin of His chosen ones even as the wrath of His Father was poured out on Him, cursed on a cross. God's acceptance of this substitution was then confirmed by Christ's resurrection! The sinless Lamb of God died and was raised to secure our redemption!

So, as we celebrate Christmas, we celebrate the coming of this Lamb who will someday receive all the adoration He is due: power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing! (Revelation 5:12) For now, what can I give Him in gratefulness for what He has done?

"Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." (Ephesians 5:1,2)

Prayer: O great God, you are worthy of all honor and praise! Thank you for the priceless gift of Jesus, the spotless Lamb who purchased redemption with His blood. Please help me to live my life as a living sacrifice, devoted to you. In Jesus' name, Amen.

#### December 11 Healer ~ Matthew 9:35

The ninth chapter of Matthew begins and ends with Jesus healing. Our verse today is Matthew 9:35: "And Jesus went throughout all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction."

Let's look first at where Jesus went. Verse 35 tell us throughout ALL the cities and villages, every single one of them... large cities and small villages. No place was too big or too little for Jesus to visit. Each one was important to Him.

Why did He go there? He went to teach in the Jewish synagogues (churches), to preach the good news of salvation through faith in Him and to heal the people who came to see Him. He taught, preached and healed every place He visited.

Our parents teach us about many things, such as right and wrong and how to brush our teeth. Our Sunday school teachers help us learn about God the Father, Jesus the Son and the Holy Spirit. Pastors Matt, Brian, Josh and Mark preach from the Bible and help us understand God's words to us. The doctors we go to help heal us from things like a cold or put a cast on a broken arm. Many people around us every day teach, preach and heal.

However, in Matthew 9:35, Jesus came to the people as a servant healer. He healed those around Him because of His love for them, of His own will, not because someone made Him do it. In His heart and with His life, He wanted to help stop hurt and pain in people.

Verse 35 says Jesus was healing EVERY disease and EVERY affliction. A disease is a sickness that affects a person, keeping his/her body from working normally. An affliction is weakness in a person's body, mind or spirit. In every person who came to Jesus for help, Jesus healed them... every single person, every single disease, every single affliction.

Prayer: Let's pray together today: Dear Jesus, thank You for coming to teach us, to tell us the Good News of faith and eternal life and to heal us. We praise You, because we understand that You are the Great Physician, the Great Doctor. We are thankful that we are ALL important enough for You to see us and to care about us. We pray for others, our families and ourselves for You to heal our hearts, our minds, our bodies, our spirits, wherever it is needed. Heal us so we can serve you with ALL of ourselves. In Jesus' precious name, AMEN.

#### December 12 The Bread of Life ~ John 6:35

Jesus knew how to put things into terms that people could relate to. From biscuits to baguettes, and bagels to brioche, bread has been a mealtime staple throughout the ages. In fact, bread is often used as a metaphor for our most essential needs. For example, "bread and butter" refers to the having the basics in life, and "having enough bread" refers to having enough money to live on. The people Jesus was speaking to would have viewed bread as a staple of their daily diet.

Jesus had just fed the 5,000 with 5 loaves of bread and 2 fish. After everyone had enough to eat, there were 12 baskets left over! The next day the people followed him. He pointed out that they were only following him for physical nourishment, but that they were missing the bigger picture. He was offering something much greater - something lasting and eternal. He referenced the manna their forefathers had eaten in the desert. God provided that bread to the Israelites every day to nourish them. But that bread would not keep. If they gathered more than one day's worth it would rot overnight. Its nourishment was also temporary because our physical bodies will eventually die. But Jesus is the bread of LIFE. He is not temporary like manna; he is eternal. Through him we also can have eternal life in heaven with God the Father.

The feeling of hunger can leave us feeling desperate. We've all seen images of starving people who are given food. They seem desperate to eat as much as they can, as fast as they can. Likewise, our spiritual selves need nourishment. Without spiritual nourishment we can feel empty to the point of desperation. Our culture offers lots of counterfeit solutions to fill our sense of emptiness: entertainment, material wealth, alcohol and drugs, etc. Those things may satisfy us for a short time, but eventually they will spoil and we'll hunger for something lasting. Jesus offers that through a relationship with him. But just like nourishment for our physical bodies, we need a daily walk with Jesus for our spiritual health. ### December 19 Son of David ~ Matthew 21:9

"It's all in a name." For many people, lineage is important. Who someone's parents or grandparents are is enough to garner approval or maybe disfavor. To this day, when I visit my dad's hometown of Gap, Pennsylvania, if people know I am Dr. Beacher's granddaughter, or George Beacher's daughter, there is an instant connection.

When we don't know someone's family background or there isn't name recognition, it can often take time to build relationships and trust. In a culture where importance is placed on a name and too often on perceived status, approval is initially granted based on lineage. To some, family connections can be significant.

The importance on lineage is nothing new. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey and the exuberant crowd cried out, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" They recognized his kinship with King David. They knew of his family history. Through their salutations to the Son of David, they beseeched Jesus in Hebrew to "Save us," and they acknowledged his royal lineage. Their praise-filled cries declared that Jesus was the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy. The Messiah from the seed of David had arrived. (2 Samuel 7:12-16).

In Matthew 1:1 we read God's account of the origin of Jesus Christ, "This is the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah the son of David, the son of Abraham." From his humble birth in Bethlehem, to his triumphant entry on a donkey, the people recognized his royal lineage.

Jesus, through his birth, crucifixion and resurrection, has made it possible for us to be joint heirs with him. We are washed in the blood, made new, and we share Jesus' name. As Christians, we are grafted into this beautiful family tree. The hymn "Family of God" is a beautiful reminder of this:

"I'm so glad I'm a part of the Family of God, I've been washed in the fountain, cleansed by His blood. Joint heirs with Jesus as we travel this sod, For I'm part of the family, The Family of God."

As we pause to celebrate the birth of Christ, we can rejoice in God's divine plan. Those who saw Christ in person, recognized the significance of his lineage as they cried out, Hosanna, to the Son of David!" Now, through faith in Christ, we are part of that family.

#### December 20 Suffering Servant ~ Isaiah 53:4-6

These words were written by Isaiah the prophet between 745 and 680 B.C. He begins these 3 verses by affirming that Jesus "has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows". According to some commentaries, "borne" and "carried" imply the taking of our burden, placing the weight of it on his shoulders and bearing it away.

Then Isaiah prophetically tells that the Jewish people will see Christ's suffering and death as punishment from God. The self-righteous, arrogant Jewish leaders of Jesus' day called him a blasphemer and a deceiver and demanded that he be crucified. But in verse 5 Isaiah says it was for our sins that he suffered. Words used in these verses certainly evoke visions of agony: stricken, smitten, afflicted, wounded, pierced, crushed. Verse 6 tells us that we all, like wayward sheep, are bent on going our own way. In Romans 3:23 Paul writes, "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God". 2 Corinthians 5:21 says, "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."

The last half of verse 5 in our Isaiah passage says, "the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed". He suffered punishment for us so we can have the peace of God and peace with God. He suffered wounds so that one day we can experience complete healing. He suffered being crushed and separated from the Father so we can dwell with him for eternity.

One of my favorite songs is "How Deep the Father's Love For Us". Verse 1 of the lyrics reads-

How deep the Father's love for us

How vast beyond all measure

That He should give His only Son

To make a wretch His treasure

At this point in the song my eyes have filled with tears. The next several verses cause the tears to run down my face, especially where they mention "my sin on His shoulders" and "my mocking voice among the scoffers".

Then come the precious words of the last verse-

"Why should I gain from His reward?

I cannot give an answer

But this I know with all my heart

His wounds have paid my ransom."

- How has God used opposition in your life to transform you more into His likeness?
- How has your personal suffering been used by God to form in you a spirit of perseverance, character, and hope?

The apostles loved God more than anything else. Their love was clearly displayed in the urgency in which they shared the gospel. "We must obey God rather than men!" (Acts 5:29) They joyfully obeyed. Just like the apostles, Jesus wants our full obedience in evangelism. "Evangelism is speaking to anyone, anywhere, the gospel." (John Piper)

In this Advent season, may the treasure of our hearts be only Jesus. May the proclamation of our life be only Jesus. May the one thing that brings us serious joy be only Jesus.

Now and forever you have a personal advocate who pleads your cause to the High Ruler of all creation.
